He acknowledges that we are on the ancestral territorial lands of the Mikmaqi people and would like to thank the Mikmaqi people today for their ancestors sharing these precious lands with all our ancestors, whether they arrived here 400 years ago or four years ago. ERRORS AND OMISSIONS/CORRECTION OF MINUTES

Deputy Warden Murray asked if there were any errors, omissions, or corrections in the minutes for the September 2, 2025, Council Meeting. The minutes of the August 5, 2025, Council Meeting were reviewed by the Municipal Council. Deputy Warden Murray proclaimed the minutes of the meeting of September 2, 2025, as the official record of the meeting.

<u>PUBLIC HEARING – DANGEROUS AND UNSIGHTLY PROPERTY</u> 808 GRANTON, ABERCROMBIE ROAD

Mr. Hale noted that the dangerous and unsightly complaint was first filed in June 2021, followed by a site visit. The property was then posted as dangerous and unsightly, and since that time, not much has been done to rectify its issues. In November 2024, a second complaint was received regarding the property, stating that the building had deteriorated further, with the walls starting to collapse and the roof compromised. The property was once again posted as dangerous and unsightly. The area where the building is located is frequented by children because it is a school bus stop, posing a serious safety concern. Mr. Hale requested support from Council for the notice of the demolition of this property.

The property owner, Mr. Bruce Levy, was present to address Council regarding the property. Mr. Levy stated that using the building as leverage and indicated that demolishing the building would be preferable, as it costs tax dollars and looks horrible.

Mr. Levy detailed emails sent to various individuals to address the water issues with the lot and the sinkhole on the property. Mr. Levy stated that there is a water problem. Mr. Levy is trying to help the citizens of Abercrombie resolve this situation and will help in any way possible to find a solution. Mr. Levy does not feel it is safe for heavy equipment to be in the lot. My Levy is concerned that somebody could get hurt if they enter the property.

Clr. Thompson expressed concerns that the municipality has some liability and the report has been sent to Council stating the building is dangerous and unsightly. Clr. Thompson noted that many residents in the community want to see a resolution. Clr. Thompson said there are two separate issues: the water problem and the dangerous and unsightly building. Clr. Thompson recommended addressing the dangerous and unsightly issue and obtaining a legal opinion before making any decisions. Clr. Baillie questions why Council would be involved in the property other than to address the dangerous and unsightly. Warden Parker agrees that there are two separate issues, and the county could be liable if the dangerous and unsightly conditions are not addressed, and that is what should be concentrated on.

Ms. Manning noted that working together with Council would be beneficial and suggested that a food drive event could be added on if an event is being held. Ms. Manning stated that the Food Bank would happily work together to provide promotion and support. Clr. Parker questioned whether the Food Bank can help individuals without a home address. Ms. Manning said that, unfortunately, more unhoused people are using the food bank than ever before. Ms. Manning noted that there is a different criteria for homeless individuals. Ms. Manning stated that Nova Scotia has the country's highest rate of food insecurity, at about 29%.

Clr. Turner questioned whether the food bank serves a certain demographic more. Ms. Manning said an increase is seen in the working poor, seniors, and working families.

Council members expressed thanks to Ms. Manning for the presentation.
