ANTI- RACISM CHARTER

Deputy Warden Wayne Murray read the Anti-Racism Charter in Recreation to Council, followed by an official signing:

ANTI-RACISM CHARTER IN RECREATION

WHEREAS Recreation Nova Scotia's Anti-Racism Charter is committed to continued learning and action.

WHEREAS there is a responsibility on all those involved in the sector to acknowledge and address racism in recreation.

WHEREAS collaboration across the recreation sector and beyond, along with building meaningful partnerships, is necessary for any anti-racism initiative to impact positively.

WHEREAS there is no requirement for racialized people to lead this work. However, ensuring ample opportunity for those with lived experience to communicate and impact change is necessary and fundamental to the work moving forward.

WHEREAS recreation is a powerful tool that can bring diverse communities and individuals together. This distinctive characteristic makes it even more important to ensure that everyone is welcome to participate, lead and support the recreation activities that interest them.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED the Council for the County of the Municipality of Pictou adopt Recreation Nova Scotia's Anti-Racism Charter as a practical tool shaped by recreation employees, volunteers and participants to engage in the work necessary to acknowledge and confront continued harms caused by racism in recreation.

UPDATE ON NEW SCOTLAND BUSINESS PARK

Clr. Palmer reported to Council an update on the progress being made at the East River Business Park owned by New Scotland Business Inc.

On February 16, Frank MacFarlane received a Letter of Intent from a developer interested in the land at the end of Victory Court. Consolidated land size is approximately 4 acres. In addition to the offer price, the Board has approved a period of 90 days during which time the developer can perform due diligence. If all goes to plan, the Board will be in position to negotiate an Agreement of Purchase and Sale by May 15, 2023.

There was also interest from another development group for a portion of the 4 acre parcel at the end of Victory Court but the Board decided to accept the offer from the other developer for the total parcel of land. MacFarlane has been working with this developer and their realtor for a few months on potential land development options throughout the region and has been instructed by the Board to see if there is interest in developing the 1.5 acre parcel on Terra Cotta Drive. MacFarlane is currently working with their realtor and has met with their management team in Halifax to discuss specific land related details. He expects to receive a revised Letter of Intent for the parcel on Terra Cotta Drive within the next week. Once it is received, the Board will meet to review the details of the group's intent and make a determination on whether or not they would like to pursue the opportunity.

The Dunkeld is progressing as expected. MacFarlane has spoken with their leasing team and they are encouraged and pleasantly surprised with the interest and activity generated via their phone lines and website forms. They have been actively seeking tenants for the commercial space and have indicated that they are engaged in discussions with a number of potential office/retail/commercial tenants for the ground-floor commercial space. MacFarlane has met with the site supervisor and was pleased with the progress to date. The one concern is with the availability of tradespeople – a sentiment shared by all construction sites in the country.

The 1.9-acre lot on the corner of East River Road and North Novie Drive has officially been sold to a group of investors from the Greater Toronto Area. The buyers wish to remain anonymous for now, but the Board hopes to make an announcement about this development in the coming weeks. Once the group is in a position to disclose more information, a sign will be erected on the lot advertising the project.

RESOLUTION - NEW SCOTLAND BUSINESS PARK

It was moved by Crl. D. Parker that the following resolution be adopted by Council:

WHEREAS the Municipality of the County of Pictou and the Town of New Glasgow have created a municipal body corporate, named the New Scotland Business Development Incorporated for the purpose of development of a business park on lands adjacent to current municipal boundaries between the two municipal units;

WHEREAS New Scotland Business Development Incorporated is the owner of a parcels of land identified by Property Identification Number 65228173 is located within the current boundaries of the Town of New Glasgow;

WHEREAS New Scotland Business Development Incorporated wishes to have all its owned parcels of land be located within one municipal boundary;

WHEREAS section 357 of the Municipal Government Act, S.N.S. 1998 c. 18 requires that a Municipality make an application to the Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board for an amendment to municipal boundaries;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Municipality of the County of Pictou enter into an agreement with the Town of New Glasgow to change the mutual municipal boundary between the Municipality and the Town so as to include the lands now within the current geographic boundaries of the Town which are owned by the New Scotland Business Development Inc., and identified by PID No. 65228173, within the intended changed geographic boundaries of the Municipality.

AND FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED that the Municipality (on its own behalf or jointly with the Town) thereafter make an application to the Nova Scotia Utility & Review Board, pursuant to section 357 of the Municipal Government Act, SNS 1998. Section 18, as amended, requesting such a change to the mutual municipal boundary.

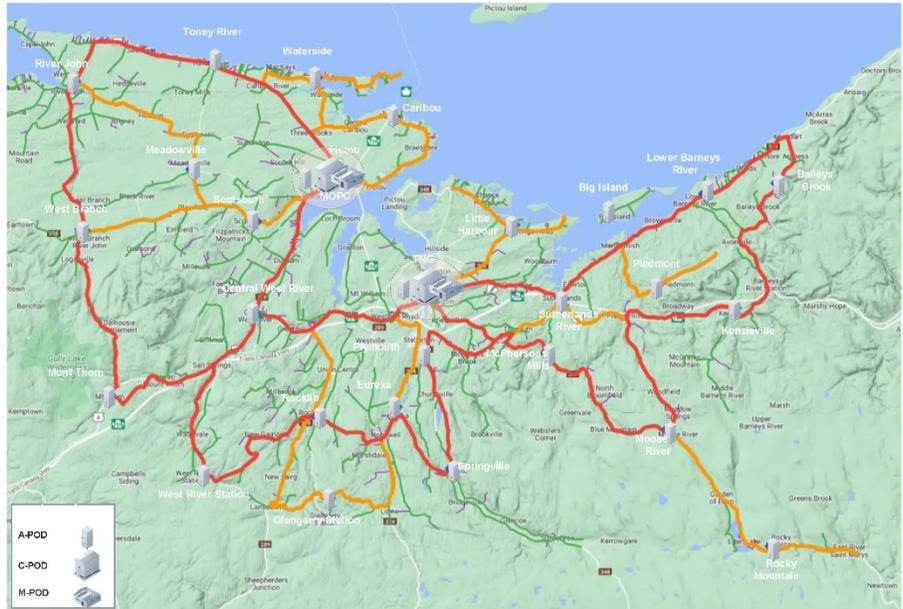

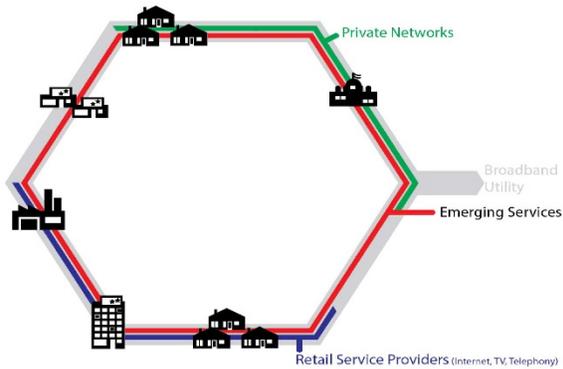

Broadband Utility – Open Market for Choice and Competition

Retail Service Providers (RSPs) are third party providers that are offering Triple-Play services on a broadband utility and are categorized by the traditional telecommunication services such as **Internet, Telephony and Television**. Already creating competitive pressure. This lowered costs of 1G service to 99\$ and soon 2.5Gbps will be introduced in 2023.

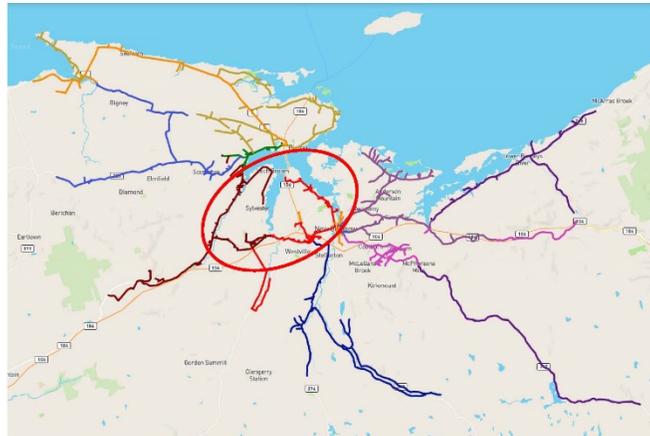
- Make Ready work has progressed to the point we can now build from CWR to the Town Hall at TNG
- Once the build to TNG is done, it is expected that the Loch Broom Loop will be ready for construction in the May time frame
- Lots of progress on Make Ready Work on Route 6 to River John, which will likely be the next build focus ~early-mid summer
- Telecon will deploy up to 4 line crews
- Nova Scotia Power has stepped up its response to permitting & Make Ready, prior meetings seem to have had a direct positive effect.

- ▶ Project reviewed in December 2022 and now with federal support by ISED, UBF-5806 and BuildNS provincial support.
- ▶ The project was conditionally approved September 2022 and will continue until December 31st 2025.
- ▶ The project extends phase I to 4641 underserved households in the county.
- ▶ The project provides for an additional 871 kms of fiber.
- ▶ The permit applications for most routes have been filed in early 2022 with most routes scope and POs have been issued to NSP on many network segments.

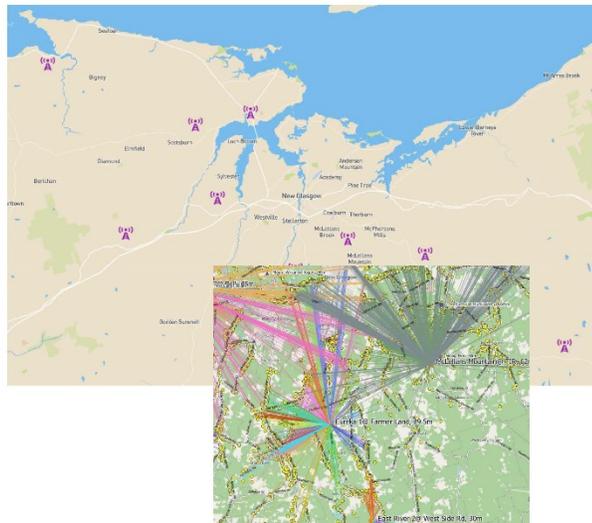


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RDN – Project Overview

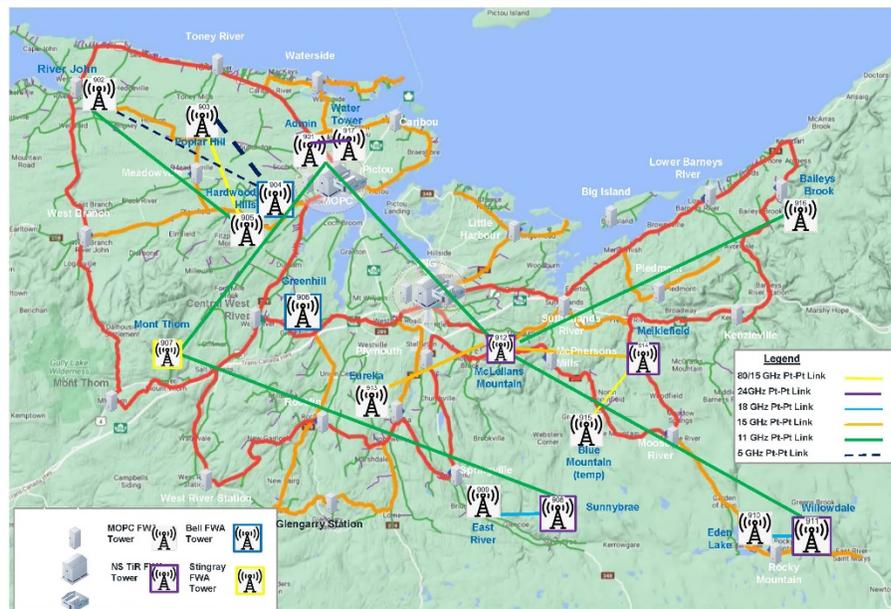
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Broadband Utility – General Updates - Wireless

- Testing continues on tower backhuls and access network
- There are 25 test subscribers on three towers
- Construction is progressing well on River John, Eden Lake, Baileys Brook, East River and Poplar Hill
- CBC has agreed to negotiate directly with the county on the Blue Mountain site
- Some equipment failures have been experienced, so the project team is taking a cautious approach to transferring the network to operations
- DUC is conducting an audit of wireless operations and expects to make recommendations to MOPC by the end of March

RIVERVIEW ADULT RESIDENTIAL HOME UPDATE

Clr. D. Parker provided Council with an update on the Riverview Adult Residential Centre. He said things are changing much faster at the centre. There is a court order that the province close institutions that provide care for people with disabilities. The client numbers at the centre have reduced from 51 residents to 33. He said the centre currently has 10 group homes (three on-site) and others in various locations in Pictou and Colchester counties. It currently has a mortgage of \$27 million done for the renovation of the building, and it is paid through per diems based on the number of residents. It currently has a deficit of about \$700,000. He said the centre has regularly communicated with the Dept. of Community Service to work on reducing that deficit. He said senior staff has been working many hours on finding new group homes, working on the financials etc. He said the centre is in the process of agreeing with Summer Street Industries to sell some land at the back of the centre for SSI's greenhouse operations. It could provide useful employment for some of the people who live there. Also, because it's geothermal and there is no cooling in the building, it is hoping it can install a system that will provide cooling and the majority of the heat. This would save \$225,000 on the oil bill and provide the building with a cooling system, accommodating the third floor where it becomes incredibly warm. The centre is also working with HCRS in terms of sharing some services.

FORMER EAST PICTOU SCHOOL CONCERNS

Clr. Boyles raised concerns about memorabilia items being left in the former East Pictou Rural High School. He said he saw a social media post with pictures piled on floors. He doesn't understand why the place wasn't cleaned out or distributed to people who want items. He said he has also heard that people are entering the building and there are safety concerns, particularly with the roof not being stable. Clr. Boyles asked permission to enter the building and see what is left inside.

Director of Public Works and Development Logan McDowell said there had been requests in the past from the public to go through the school, but he is not allowing it now, nor is MOPC staff entering the building.

Clr. Don Butler said the education foundation had removed many items from the school, and it is now in storage in Sutherland's River. He said some large pictures were smashed, but the most important memorabilia items had been removed.

Deputy Warden Murray asked if Council was in favour of Clr. Boyles entering the building. Council voted 6 to 4 that Clr. Boyles does not enter the former school because of safety concerns.

ELECTRONIC VOTING CONCERNS

Clr. Boyles said he and Warden Parker met Lwr. Sackville Coun. At a recent Nova Scotia Municipalities event, Paul Russell expressed his concerns about electronic voting. He said Clr. Russell is plenty of knowledge on the topic and now is the time for Council to hear these concerns before the next municipal election in 2024.

Clr. Boyles motioned that Mr. Russell be invited to MOPC Chambers to share his views with Council.

Clr. Thompson said he is opposed to the motion because he needs background information on Mr. Russell to determine if he has credible knowledge on the issue.

Clr. MacKeil said she is aware of electronic voting concerns and would like to hear from people in favour and against it.

ILLEGAL DUMPING REGULATIONS IN YARMOUTH

Clr. Turner spoke about a recent CBC article on how the Municipality of Yarmouth will use a reverse onus clause to combat illegal dumping. If a name is found in the items illegally dumped, and if that person fails to prove someone else dumped the garbage, they'll be on the hook for cleanup and served with a summary offence ticket with a fine of up to \$5,000. Staff said this is an issue for Pictou County Solid Waste because it has a compliance officer. The Municipality's bylaw officer does not deal with illegal dumping sites.

AGE-FRIENDLY IN FOCUS – UNDERSTANDING ACCESS AND INCLUSION FOR OLDER ADULTS IN THE BUILD ENVIROMENT

Clr.Thompson submitted an age-friendly in focus document for information purposes.
