Heating your home is also a concern with the price of fuel which is why council is currently working on getting the new PACE program established, which will help with financing to install solar panels. More details on this will be available this fall.

If you are preparing your children for the coming winter season, it can be a real burden for many families to purchase winter clothing as the little ones grow, fill the lunch boxes every day and feed hungry mouths at home. Our municipal government is contributing dollars to all schools where rural students attend to help with breakfast programs for all students. These programs are well used and much needed if we want our students to have a fair chance. New this year, our municipality has allocated funds for a backpack program for all of our county schools, proportional to the number of rural students attending. Schools send some basic foods home with children where a need is determined. Students need good nutrition, and most schools started a program on their own because they saw a need. As food costs continue to rise, we need to be there to help play our part, especially for our children.

Many of you anxiously await news on the county's high-speed internet project. The good news is that many residents will soon have access this fall to fibre to their homes and wireless service in various locations across the county through 15 towers. More good news is that the private companies competing for your high-speed internet business on our network have very competitive prices for what should be a much-improved service. The "not so good news" is that installing all the needed fibre will take time to serve the whole county. Yes, winter is coming, and it will be financially difficult for many of us and our friends and neighbours. Please be kind and helpful to each other. It will make it much easier for all of us.

MOPC Approves \$19.9 Million Operating Budget

MOPC Council approved a \$19.9 million operating budget for the 2022-2023 fiscal year. The budget was approved during a council meeting Monday, which also included keeping the tax rate like the previous year. The residential property tax rate will be 0.815 per \$100 assessment for residential and resource property and \$1.825 per \$100 assessment for commercial property. The MOPC is expected to collect \$18.1 million in property taxes while its largest expenditures continue to be protective services and education, both of which will be over \$5 million each.

MOPC Warden Robert Parker said the 2022-23 budget is good news for many rural taxpayers and for many non-profit organizations that rely on our municipal government for funding to keep their communities alive.

He said council had requests for more than a million dollars in council grants this year and could only commit to \$450,000 and still balance the budget. The warden said many valuable projects will get done in communities, but many will need to apply next year and hope for better results.

Sidewalk Design to begin in Plymouth area

CBCL Limited has been approved by the MOPC to start the sidewalk design work for the Plymouth (Blue Acres) area. MOPC Council recently approved its capital budget, which included \$50,000 for the design of new sidewalks in this area.



MOPC Rural Broadband Network

We Are Making Progress...

The Municipality of Pictou County (MOPC) is in the process of acquiring a state-of-the-art network that will allow our community to fully enter the digital world. This will result in numerous advantages and benefits for our citizens and businesses.

With this network, we will take a big step towards a promising future, which will open many new possibilities for the development and prosperity of our rural municipality.

Marketplace Fibre

We have sent more than 250 letters to homes in the Lyons Brook and Hardwood Hill areas to let residents know they can sign up for our fibre network. This is a two-step process that can be quickly done by following prompts on the website provided in the letter. Select Utility Installation to have our team visit your home to install the fibre cable drop and utility terminal. This option is free of charge while our crews are in your area. There is no obligation to subscribe to a service. Once the utility installation is complete, your home will be ready for service at any point in the future, should you decide to subscribe to one of our service providers.

MOPC Firsthome Wireless Service

For homes that will have wireless access to the MOPC network, service is expected to begin in the fall of 2022, thanks to the installation of 14 transmission towers within the municipality.

Towers are currently being tested in many areas and will be ready for service this fall. Those who are eligible for service will receive a letter in the mail with instructions on how to connect.

The MOPC network, a state-of-the-art infrastructure wholly owned by the municipality, is being built to improve the quality of life for our citizens and communities. This framework will also allow the municipality to generate revenue by collecting fees from the internet service providers using our infrastructure to provide you with high-speed internet. This revenue will be used to pay for the cost of the project.

REGIONAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT ORGANIZATON



Pictou County REMO is the agency that takes care of Emergency Management planning, preparation, response, and recovery in Pictou County. Every municipality in the province is responsible for emergency management in their areas, and Pictou County REMO helps make sure that all our municipalities, police departments, fire departments, and others can deal with any emergency that happens and continue to provide the essential services needed in our communities. Do you have your civic number on your property?

Civic numbers play an essential role in helping first responders find you in an emergency. We cannot stress how important it is that you and everyone in your home and workplace know your civic address and post it properly.

If I do not have civic number, how do I get one?

You can call the Municipality of Pictou County's GIS department to speak to our civic addressing coordinator. The phone number is 902-485-1201 or he can be reached at gis@munpict.ca.

How do you purchase civic number signs?

Some local fire departments will order signs for residents. See the list of fire departments and businesses that provide that can provide signs.

Can I place my sign anywhere on my property?

Fossil Farms Oceanside Retreat

The MOPC Climate Advisory Committee recently met at Fossil Farms in Egerton. It was the perfect venue for the meeting, considering the oceanside retreat is powered by solar and has many recreational and outdoor activities, including canoeing and kayaking on Merigomish Harbour.

Fossil Farms has seven cottages for daily rentals and a conference room in its main barn with a full kitchen for catered events such as weddings, business meetings and family gatherings.

There is also a vineyard on the property, greenhouses, and a small hobby farm that includes sheep and chickens. Guests are encouraged to tour the property during their stay and enjoy the firepits and shelters throughout the farm for evening gatherings under the stars.



The main barn's conference area is perfect for businesses looking for a new atmosphere to host meetings or special events.



The main barn near the entrance of the farm has a full kitchen to cater events as well as dining area and conference room.



Comfortable seating areas are available in the main barn where guests can gather to chat, play boardgames or read.

Rebates and assistance available to help offset home heating costs

Now that the outside temperature is starting to drop, energy cost savings are top of mind for many people. Did you know that Nova Scotia residents can apply to several rebate programs that could help reduce their energy costs this winter?

Home Warming – This program offers nocharge energy assessments and free home upgrades to eligible Nova Scotians. The plan is open to income-qualified homeowners. If the evaluation proves that draft-proofing, insulation, or other efficiency options can make a difference in heating or cooling your home, it will install the upgrades at no cost. Eligible participants must meet the total net income levels; you must own a single-unit home in Nova Scotia and provide proof of ownership, you must live in your home yearround with no plans to sell soon and your home must not have already been upgraded through Home Warming or the Low-Income Homeowner Service. Salvation Army Good Neighbour Energy Fund

- The Good Neighbour Energy Fund is an emergency heating program available to Nova Scotian families. This program, administered by The Salvation Army, receives its funds from Nova Scotia Power Inc., NSP employees and customers, and the Nova Scotia Provincial Government. Applicants can re-apply every 24 months to the program, which runs annually from January through April. If you are in an emergency home heating situation, please download the application form or pick one up from your local Salvation Army church or thrift store, as well as MLA offices. Efficiency Nova Scotia has several rebate programs available. A home energy assessment is highly recommended to determine if rebates apply to insulation, heating pumps, wood/pellet burning equipment, solar equipment, and other upgrades. Pictou County Fuel Fund — This local program provides short-term assistance to people who don't have other options and face the prospects of an unheated home environment. NS Government Expands Senior Care Grant Program

Older Nova Scotians can now apply for grants to help with the cost of household chores, healthcare services and home heating.

The Seniors Care Grant program provides up to \$500 to help support eligible seniors to live well at home.

It covers the costs of snow removal, small repairs, lawn care, transportation, grocery and medication delivery, phone and internet expenses and some health care procedures. People applying for the grant can also apply for a new, one-time grant of \$250 to help with heating costs.

It is available to Nova Scotians 65 years and older, including people who have already received money through the Seniors Care Grant or Heating Assistance Rebate Program in the past year. The grant is available for the cost of furnace oil, natural gas, propane, firewood, wood pellets and electricity.

Thorburn Celebrates 150 Years

A large crowd gathered in Thorburn on August 27, 2022, to celebrate the unveiling of Thorburn's new historical kiosk. Thorburn residents June MacDonald, Claire Murphy, Kay Kirk, Gerry Rogers and Gerald MacLellan, unveiled the historical panels in the newly constructed kiosk on property donated by Colin and Judd Johnstone. The kiosk is located across from the Thorburn Fire Hall. The project was spearheaded by Gayle Jordan, Kathy Campbell and Manon Potvin along with committee members Art Forsyth, Dave Sponagle and Randy Palmer. Historian John Ashton provided much of the information about Thorburn's rich history gathered through extensive research. The committee and community members also contributed information and photos for the panels. Financial assistance came from The Province of Nova Scotia and the Municipality of the County of Pictou. Additional support came from the Thorburn Fire Department, which hosted a fun day for the community before the unveiling ceremony. Local contractors William Myers, Jeff Dewtie Excavating, Blaine MacLane Excavation and Auto Trim Design were responsible for building the kiosk and the surrounding landscaping. When you get an opportunity, it is worth the trip to drop by and see the kiosk that honours Thorburn's history. It will surely bring back some memories.

Assistance available for people impacted by Hurricane Fiona

Nova Scotians who have been severely impacted by hurricane Fiona will receive financial support from the province. The following one-time financial assistance will be offered to eligible Nova Scotians:

- \$100 for every household that lost power for at least 48 hours to cover the cost of spoiled food
- \$250 for every person that must pay for tree or debris removal from their property
- an additional \$250 on top of the existing \$750 seniors care grant to help with storm repairs
- \$150 to all current income assistance recipients, including Disability Support Program participants receiving income support
- \$1,000 per household in emergency funding for people ordered out of their homes or who cannot return to their homes; people can register with the Canadian Red Cross online at https://www.redcross.ca/how-we-help/current-emergency-responses/hurricane-fiona-2022 or by calling 1-800-863-6582 between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m.

Funding will also be provided to support community organizations that help people:

- a \$2-million fund will assist community centres with the purchase and installation of generators
- \$500,000 to Feed Nova Scotia and \$150,000 in total for non-member food banks in Cape Breton and eastern Nova Scotia
- \$100,000 to Salvation Army and Red Cross organizations in Cape Breton
- \$100,000 in total to shelters in Cape Breton and eastern Nova Scotia to help with extra demand
- \$100,000 to establish a hotel fund, administered by Cape Breton Community Housing, to provide temporary accommodations for people in shelters who cannot go back into their homes
- \$150,000 to distribute support to families in need through the SchoolsPlus program; the support will come in the form of grocery store cards and access to food, where possible.

GOPLAY PICTOU COUNTY EQUIPMENT LOAN PROGRAM



The Municipality of Pictou County has joined forces with other municipal units to create a county-wide equipment loan program. Equipment can be loaned out to anyone, free of charge, by filling out an online application form. Cross-sharing is permitted, meaning you can receive equipment from any municipality on the site. There is equipment available for all seasons.

Once your application is approved, you will be given instructions for the pickup and drop off of the equipment. All we ask is that you take good care of it.

Examples of equipment available for the fall include: Inflatable Paddleboards Bicycles and Ebikes Canoes and Kayaks Nordic Walking Poles Camping Equipment Activity Kits and Giant Games

Winter items such as snowshoes, Yak Traks, and cross-country skis will be available from November to March.

Fire Prevention Week 2022

October 9 – 15th is Fire Prevention week; this year Fire Prevention week celebrates its 100th anniversary of providing information on how to prevent and prepare for fire. This year's topic is "Fire won't wait, Plan your escape".


In a fire, mere seconds can mean the difference between a safe escape and a tragedy. Fire safety education isn't just for school children. Teenagers, adults, and the elderly are also at risk of fires, making it important for every member of the community to take some time every October during Fire Prevention Week to make sure they understand how to stay safe in case of a fire.

Home fire escape planning and practicing

It is important for everyone to plan and practice a home fire escape. Everyone needs to be prepared in advance so that they know what to do when the smoke alarm sounds. Given that every home is different, every home fire escape plan will also be different.

Have a plan for everyone in the home. Children, older adults, and people with disabilities may need assistance to wake up and get out. Make sure that someone will help them!





Smoke alarms

Smoke alarms sense smoke well before you can, alerting you to danger. Smoke alarms need to be in every bedroom, outside of the sleeping areas (like a hallway), and on each level (including the basement) of your home. Do not put smoke alarms in your kitchen or bathrooms.

Choose an alarm that is listed with a testing laboratory, meaning it has met certain standards for protection.

For the best protection, use combination smoke and carbon monoxide alarms that are interconnected throughout the home. These can be installed by a qualified electrician, so that when one sounds, they all sound. This ensures you can hear the alarm no matter where in your home the alarm originates.

Be a Volunteer Firefighter


The Municipality of Pictou County has 18 volunteer fire departments, serving approximately 22,000 residents in different communities throughout our municipality. Our county has multiple districts, ranging from heavily rural, to large commercial and industrial properties.

Currently, we have approximately 400 volunteer firefighters, proudly serving their communities. Tasks range from fire suppression, motor vehicle collisions, water rescue, medical emergencies, fire prevention and other public and agency assistance calls.

Some common misconceptions regarding joining your local fire department are that you will be required to actively fight a fire, which is not true; We require volunteers for ALL positions, these can include but are not limited to, Driver/Operators, Safety Officers, Accountability Officers, Traffic Control, and other supportive roles. There is no age limit for who can apply, and there is a job for all skill and comfort levels. There are a few benefits to becoming a volunteer firefighter:

- Federal tax credit of \$3000/year
- Provincial tax refund of \$500/year
- Free registration for one set of firefighter plates for your vehicle
- A comprehensive insurance package which includes WCB coverage, as well as VFIS coverage
- Operate as part of a team
- Make a difference in your community



Earn a High School Credit for being part of a local fire station

New this year in our county is a Fire Cadet program being offered by some of our counties fire departments. This means that if you are a student in Pictou County in grades 10 through 12, you can sign up for our fire cadet program, and after completing the required curriculum, you will be given a Personal Development Credit that is offered by the Province of Nova Scotia.

It is important to be a responsible dog owner!

The Municipality of Pictou County (MOPC) can impose fines to dog owners if dogs are running at large off their property.

The MOPC encourages all dog owners to register their dogs so they can be easily identified if they are found off their property. It may not seem like much, but a small metal tag on your dog's collar can mean keeping your dogs safe, and home, where they belong.

MOPC Tags are \$10 for spayed and neutered dogs, and it is a lifetime tag. Non-spayed and non-neutered tags are \$35.00. You can purchase your dog tag(s) at the MOPC Administration Building at 46 Municipal Drive, Pictou, NS.

The benefit of a registered dog is that if we pick up your dog running at large, the first time, we will return your dog directly to you. If it is not tagged, we will take it to the SPCA, and you will be required to pay all fees associated with impounding the dog(s) until they are reclaimed by its owners. The MOPC can set associated fees as high as \$410.00 and dogs will not be returned until the owner has registered and tagged the dog.

We thank rural Pictou County residents for your ongoing cooperation and wish you and your four-legged friends a wonderful summer. Attached for your information and reference is the Dog Tag Registration Form which contains an overview of Offences and Penalties from the MOPC Dog Control Bylaw.
