

### **Wrap Up and Questions**

Clr. D. Parker thanked the members for their thorough presentation and commented it was nice to see support from other community organizations. Clr. Parker stated that facilities such as the one proposed for River John are expensive and he believes there needs to be a master plan created for facilities and we need to answer the question of how many is enough. Ms. Barry stated that in the United States there are communities with populations of 8000 people having 16 pickleball courts.

Clr. Dewar thanked the members for their presentation and asked the members, if Council was to support the project, could the group accept the funding over multiple years like what happened in Little Harbour. Mr. Taylor said that the group could work within whatever council choses.

Clr. Elliott thanked the group for the presentation and offered her support towards the project.

Deputy Warden Murray asked for clarification on who would own the facility. Mr. Taylor said that the River John Pickle Ball Society will operate the facility and the River John Legion will ultimately be the owner as it is constructed on their property and leased to the Pickleball Society.

Warden Parker asked as a follow up, who has the insurance on the facility. Mr. Taylor stated that the River John Pickleball Society carries the general liability insurance. This insurance is obtained by being a member organization of the Canadian Pickleball Association. This insurance covers members of the organization and is paid through membership fees.

Warden Parker thanked the River John Pickleball Society for their presentation and excused them from the balance of the meeting.

### A) PROCLAMATION CROHN'S AND COLITIS AWARENESS MONTH

Warden Parker read the following proclamation:

### **PROCLAMATION**

I, Robert Parker, Warden of the Municipality of the County of Pictou do hereby proclaim the month of November 2022 as **Crohn's and Colitis Awareness Month** 

**WHEREAS:** Crohn's and Colitis Canada is a national, volunteer-based non-profit organization supporting the over 270,000 Canadians living with inflammatory bowel disease (IBD), a chronic autoimmune disease that causes the body to attach healthy tissue, leading to inflammation of part of or all of the digestive system; and

**WHEREAS:** People living with IBD routinely endure abdominal pain, cramping, fatigue, internal bleeding, and frequent and urgent bowel movements – in some cases over 20 times a day. While more than five million people globally live with IBD, Canada has one of the highest prevalence rates in the world, with the Atlantic provinces having the highest rates in the country. By 2030, experts predict the number of Canadians living with IBD to exceed 400,000 – one per cent of the population. Currently there is no cure; and

WHEREAS: Every November, Canada celebrates Crohn's and Colitis Awareness Month. As part of this initiative, landmarks across Canada are illuminated red in a show of support for everyone impacted by IBD; and

**WHEREAS:** To learn more about Crohn's and Colitis Canada and the work the organization does, please visit crohnsandcolitis.ca

**THEREFORE,** I, Robert Parker, Warden of the Municipality of the County of Pictou, do hereby proclaim this month of November 2022 be "Crohn's and Colitis Awareness Month" in the Municipality of the County of Pictou

# B) UNITED CHURCH OF CANADA REQUESTING COUNCIL SUPPORT A UNIVERSAL BASIC INCOME.

### **MOTION**

It was moved by Clr. Turner, seconded by Clr. D. Parker that Council sends a letter of support to the federal and provincial governments supporting the creation of a universal basic income.

- Clr. Turner spoke about the vast research that has been done on this issue over the years. A universal income will lessen marginalized communities and is a way for the redistribution of wealth.
- Clr. D. Parker stated that this idea has been around for decades and has many benefits. It allows those in poverty to get out of the cycle; however, it is not a cure all and there needs to be a considerable amount of thought given to the program rules.
- Clr. Thompson stated that is about social advocacy and Pictou County has a lot of child poverty and need to find ways to help.
- Clr. Palmer stated that he has concerns with this support and does not fully understand howe this will work. There are a lot of businesses that cannot find workers and will a program such as this erode the workforce even further.

Warden Parker stated that there are lots of different supports and the social system that is in place today is very convoluted; however, society needs to do more to eliminate discrimination towards the marginalized communities.

- Clr. Boyles stated that he has a similar concern to Clr. Palmer that we do not have enough information.
- Clr. Butler stated that he is concerned with what this might do to the workforce and the impacts it will have on local businesses.
- Clr. Turner stated that the people that require the universal income cannot influence the change required to implement this system. It is about the redistribution of wealth.
- Clr. Thompson suggested that perhaps it would be worthwhile having the authors of the letter present to Council on this topic prior to a formal decision.

On agreement of the mover and seconder, the motion to write a letter to the Federal and Provincial Governments supporting a universal income was withdrawn.

Clr. Palmer presented the following resolution:

**WHEREAS** Section 369 of the Municipal Government Act requires Councils of every town and Municipality to apply to the Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board to confirm or alter the number and boundaries of polling districts and the number of Councilors;

**WHEREAS** the Municipality is required to conduct a study into the reasonableness and fairness of the number of councilors before making an application to the Board;

**WHEREAS** the Municipality conducted a public consultation process which involved 5 in-person sessions; along with a virtual session during the month of September 2022:

**WHEREAS** the Municipality also sought opinions from residents at the public consultation sessions and through an online survey on the number of councilors and the style of governance (Mayor vs Warden System);

**WHEREAS** the majority of respondents to a survey conducted at the public consultation sessions and online submissions support the current number of councilors and the Warden system of Council governance;

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, by the Council for the Municipality of the County of Pictou that the Municipal Council submits and application to the Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board to confirm the number of Councilors at 12.

### **BDO Zone Initiative Pictou County**

Mr. McDowell provided Council with a brief overview of the project being planned in conjunction with the Pictou County Partnership on the rating program for biofuel production.

Clr. Parker stated that our area is very good at growing trees such as poplar; however, the events of September 23<sup>rd</sup> with Hurricane Fiona we will see much of this wood simply rot in the woods.

Clr. Palmer asked if we are only talking about waste wood or the entire system. Mr. McDowell responded that it is about the entire system ability to create biofuel.

Clr. Thompson stated that he supports this initiative as our forests are an awful mess right now and this could be the best use.

### **MOTION**

It was moved by Deputy Warden Murray, seconded by Clr. Butler that the Council provide a letter of support for the BDO Zone Initiative.

Motion Carried

### **HURRICANE FIONA CLEANUP**

Evan Hale, Director of Emergency Services provided an update on the cleanup of roadside materials and the various crews that our working on the effort. Mr. Hale stated that one of the issues that has come up, is that once we have cleaned an area more material is then being placed curbside. Warden Parker said that the intention was to only do a road once and asked of the message is not getting out there. Sueann

Musick replied that message has been communicated from the very start.

Mr. Hale stated that it is difficult to gauge our progress as of now; as District 2 has had an immense amount of materials down and will take a long time.

Clr. Butler stated that the original plan was to have three crews from Ontario. Mr. Hale responded that the company surveyed the municipality and determined that their larger piece of equipment would not efficient. Clr. Butler expressed concern with the having to repeat roads when other areas have not received any collection. Mr. Hale stated that with the deployment of the grapple trucks this week we should see better progress.

Clr. Wadden expressed the concern that people would like to know where we will be working next. Mr. Hale stated that daily updates can be provided.

Clr. Parker stated that we need to provide the message for people to be patient with the cleanup.

Clr. Palmer asked how many hours day crews are working and about traffic control. Mr. Hale responded that crews are working 10-11 hours per day. The crews are working with the Department of Public Works who is providing traffic control and are using the best practice for mobile operations. There are some concerns around the busier roads and we may need to adjust the pick ups and arrange for different traffic controls.

Clr. Palmer stated that we have planned for 25 days and is that realistic. Mr. Hale stated that he is optimistic that we will meet the targets; however, this week will provide us a better understanding.

Clr. Turner stated that we have created priority areas; however, have created a more detailed schedule. Mr. Hale stated that the chipping crews will in an area for extended periods of time. Mr. Hale stated that we will be able to provide a better schedule or routine of the grapple trucks on a daily basis.

Warden Parker asked about the overall progress of the budget. The CAO responded that the budget at present is not a concern; however, this week will provide us better understanding and we should be able to do a better forecast.

### **URBAN FORESTRY CONFERENCE**

CIr. Boyles thanked Sueann Musick for circulating his report to Council. CIr. Boyles stated that he learned a lot about trees, and soils, at this conference. CIr. Boyles stated that he talked to the Atlantic rep for Trees Canada, and who is willing to meet with the Municipality, to tell us what Trees Canada can do for us and what grants are available for us.

Dr. David Phillips reported to the conference the message that just because we don't know everything about climate change, does not mean we should ignore it. We need to prepare for a different climate soon. Climate change is happening faster than expected. Trees are the first victims of climate change. Rainwater will last 8 days on grass and 8 minutes in a paved parking lot, to get down to the water table. We need by laws for greener places, more grass less concrete and more trees.

We need to plant the right trees in the right place. We cannot prevent the wind, and rain, from coming but we can better prepare for it. We need to check the strength of our infrastructure and don not cut maintenance budgets.

An interesting concept is that we should be GPS where the trees we give away are planted and send reminders to people with trees when it's hot and they should be watering them. Plants and animals affect soils and 70 % of people have no knowledge of soil. We are taking away habitat from wildlife. Nature stores carbon, when we destroy this, we release carbon.

### **COMMUNITY ANNOUCEMENTS**

Clr. Boyles stated that there are a lot of concerns about the East Pictou and vandalism. Mr. McDowell stated that they are getting quotes to secure the property. The CAO has issued a Request for Proposal for the Redevelopment of the property which closes on November 17, 2022.

Clr. Thompson brought to the attention of Council that Mike Hechimovich was recently presented the Recreation Nova Scotia Bluenose Achievement Award.

Warden Parker reported that the Salem Ballfield held its first event just before Halloween. They have upgraded some of the infrastructure at the ballfield and will continue to redevelop the site.

Warden Parker reminded Council that November is Prostate Cancer Awareness Month, and he is growing a mustache for "Movember"

Sueann Musick informed Council that Arlene MacGregor received the Provincial Volunteer of the Year Award today in Halifax.

Clr. Dewar brought to the attention that Hector MacKenzie passed away at the age of 102. Mr. MacKenzie worked for the betterment of the community and worked at the exhibition and was a member of the school board for many years.

### **EMERGENCY RESOLUTIONS**

There were no emergency resolutions.

### ADJOURN

There being no further business to come before the meeting the Deputy Warden declared the meeting adjourned (9:30 pm).
