Clr. Boyles asked if there any update on the STPs in Hillside and Abercrombie and the Deputy Municipal Clerk replied the information was passed onto the Director of Public Works.

Motion carried.

INTERNET PROJECT STATUS REPORT

The CAO informed Council the consortium team continues to work on the detailed design and field work. The focus at present is engineering and design. The Municipality is broken down into 8 zones and they are focusing on Zone 8 which is the area of the administration building. They will then move to zone 7 which is the central part of the County around Highway 104. Plexus who are the network designers were onsite here today to look at this building and a potential communications tower site which is proposed for here. We are continuing to develop a marketing plan so the Marketing Director for Nova is working with our Communications Officer and there is an update to go on the website as the project develops. There was some discussion several months ago on the use of the upstairs in this building as an innovation center which is still in play but it may also be an operations center for the actual network. The actual space requirements for the operations center are fairly minimal so both can exist together. Additional information has been submitted to Develop NS but there has been no response as yet.

Warden R. Parker reported that we are going to get provincial and federal funding eventually but we have to be patient in the meantime.

The CAO informed Council that in the last 2 weeks we have applied for non-dominant carrier status which will give us the ability to own an internet network as well as the proposed communications tower on site. We are within 15 km. of an airport so we require Transport Canada and NAV Canada approvals on site so both applications have been submitted.

Clr. Wadden asked about the design approach and the CAO replied that the fiber build will be broken down into zones so there will be a logical methodology of how this will be built. The focus is to look at zone 8 which is the administration building which is the primary focus at present. They need to determine that this building makes sense as the epicenter of the project. The CAO pointed out because we have fiber here in this building we would be using Bell and East Link's fiber because we already have it then we would replace it with our own fiber.

CIr. Wadden asked if they are any closer on an agreement on the joint use of poles and the CAO replied once we have the detailed design we will be making application. The CAO reported 50% of the poles in the area need to be replaced and the last person on the pole pays so we would have to pay. We would look at other options whether it makes sense to trench the fiber or create our pole network, whatever is the most economical.

CIr. D. Parker informed Council that 15 months ago several members of Council attended a meeting in Truro with Development NS. He pointed out that we were promised an answer by a certain date and he asked how far past that date are we and the CAO responded the original date was July but it has since been amended to August.

Clr. D. Parker reported that we have to start putting pressure on Develop NS at some point because we need answers.

CANCELLATION OF SUNDAY SERVICE @ PC WAR MEMORIAL

Clr. Boyles reported that the Sunday Services which has been held annually at the Pictou County War Memorial on the Sunday prior to Remembrance Day for the past 83 years has been cancelled. The service was started in 1936, 3 years before the start of WWII to remember the men and women of the first world war 1914-1918 who gave the supreme sacrifice for their country and county. Since then WWII 1939-1945 and the Korean War 1950-1953 had become part of the Memorial Day Parade and service. This event was sponsored by Zone 6 of the Royal Canadian Legion in later years. Our Council lays a wreath at this event every year for the men and women of the County who gave all so we could have the freedom to live and enjoy the Country and County we have today. All of our WWI veterans are gone now and we are losing WWII and Korean vets every day. The Legion moto was "Lest We Forget" and also "We Will Remember Them" and he was having difficulty honoring those beliefs when one of the biggest days of remembrance celebrated in Pictou County has been discontinued.

MOTION

It was moved by Clr. Boyles and seconded by Clr. D. Parker a letter be sent to the Nova Scotia Command of the Royal Canadian and to Zone 6 of the Royal Canadian Legion asking that they reconsider cancelling the annual Pictou County Memorial Day Parade and Service held in Pictou on the Sunday before Remembrance Day.

- Clr. Turner asked why it was cancelled in the first place and Warden R. Parker replied that according to media reports other areas were moving in this direction.
- Clr. MacKeil suggested we should ask for clarification on why the Legion cancelled the memorial service before taking any further action.
- Clr. Wadden commented that she does not feel comfortable voting on the motion until we find out why the service was discontinued.
- Clr. Dewar suggested Council invite the Zone Commander to meet with Council to find out why the service was cancelled.

MOTION TO TABLE

It was moved by Clr. Thompson and seconded by Deputy Warden Murray that the preceding motion be tabled until Council receives further information on the cancellation of Pictou County War Memorial Service.

On the agreement of the mover and seconder, the motion to table was withdrawn.

MOTION TO AMEND

It was moved by Deputy Warden Murray and seconded by Clr. MacKeil that the motion to send a letter to the NS Command and to Zone 6 be amended to add the words "after Council has met with the Zone 6 Commander" at the end of the motion.

HOMELESS ISSUE AT GLEN HAVEN MANOR PPTY.

Clr. Boyles reported that there are homeless in the area that have some mental health issues and emphasized that we have to look at doing something for these people. If you call Adult Production they will

not do anything to help them. He informed Council a committee is going to be formed and hopefully a Councillor from each municipal unit will sit on it.

Warden R. Parker informed Council that there are some people who do not fit into Viola's Place because they are not equipped to deal with severe mental health issues. He had approached the RCMP regarding possible options and was told that options are very limited. Warden R. Parker indicated an Ad Hoc Mental Health Committee has been formed as part of the Mayors & Warden Group.

EMERGENCY RESOLUTIONS

There were no emergency resolutions.

REFERRALS TO COMMITTEES & NOTICES OF MOTION

Clr. Turner reported that he has been asked if there was an update on the Fire Departments review so he would like to have a brief discussion on that issue at a future meeting.

Clr. Turner referred to the Old Alma Road speed limit and pointed out that road is used heavily by the students of the Northumberland Regional High School. He would like to have a discussion on having the speed limit reduced on that road.

Clr. D. Parker reported that since he asked that oncology services be put on the agenda things have changed and he asked that it be withdrawn.

Clr. D. Parker reported the direction we are going to go with solid waste is high intensity incineration. There is a company operating in the province, "Sustane Nova Scotia" and that is what they are trying to do and they claim they can do it for fewer dollars than what we are paying per ton to recycle. They use a European technology that they say is cheaper and he would like them to meet with Council and outline their business model.

Clr. Dewar informed Council that he would like to see some data on what will happen if the CAP is taken off assessments.
