ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF FIRST PEOPLES & TRANSITIONAL TERRITORY

Clr. Wadden spoke in support of the principle of acknowledging at our meetings that we are on the traditional and unceded territory of the Mi'kmag people traditional territory as we are all Treaty People and our relationship together is based on peace and friendship. She explained that acknowledging Mi'kmag traditional or ancestral territory is a way of showing respect for and honoring our shared Treaty relationship. It is one of many important steps we can take toward reconciliation. In some acknowledgements we hear the "unceded" Mi'kmaw territory - it is referred to as unceded as the treaties signed between Nations were focused on Peace and Friendship not turning over their lands. The treaties between 1725 to 1763 prevented further wars. In the 18th century, Mi'kmag people and the British Crown entered historic Peace and Friendship Treaties that created treaty relationships within Mi'kma'ki. Mii'kma'ki is the traditional territory of the Mi'kmag and includes seven districts which are found in what is now known as Nova Scotia. Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, Newfoundland & Labrador, and the Gaspe region in Quebec. The traditional name for our own Pictou County is Agg Piktuk which mean "The Explosive Place". The first Reserves were established in 1801 before Canada or the US was born. An acknowledgment is not intended to create any legally binding obligations or recognition of asserted claims. Recently, most of us have heard the horrific stories coming from the residential schools where many of our First Nations were forced to attend. Hundreds of unmarked graves have been discovered and continue to be discovered. Robert Bernard who is the founder and CEO of The Indigenous Guide has 30+ years of experience working with Indigenous communities across the Atlantic Region. Mr. Bernard has been involved in the areas of culture, heritage, tourism, business development, Procurement/contracting, sports/recreation, community and event planning, climate change and cross-cultural training, He also utilizes his extensive knowledge and connections in the government and industry sectors to help provide specific guidance with your organization, project and or event in terms of navigating relationship and partnership protocols. I have had the good fortune through NSFM to attend 2 of Mr. Bernard's workshops and the information he can pass on to you is amazing. I would like to recommend this Council invite Mr. Bernard to do a presentation for all of us as it seems most here are unable to attend these valuable workshops put on for us through NSFM. His website www.theindigenousGuide.com is a very valuable source of information as we go through the processes of reconciliation. An acknowledgement is the first item on an agenda. It is a way of encouraging to acknowledge Nova Scotia is the Mi'kma'ki traditional territory. A simple acknowledgement can be, "We would like to begin by acknowledging that we are in Mi'Kma'ki (Meeg-Ma-Gee) the traditional and unceded territory of the Mi'kmag people". I know there were more involved acknowledgments included in our agenda and I appreciate whoever put that information together for us. Halifax's acknowledgement is another good example. My main reason for bringing this issue to Council is that I do truly feel we should be acknowledging our ancestral territory just out of respect for our Mi'Kmag people. Perhaps others would like to give their opinions on this acknowledgement before a motion is put forward. One item I will recommend is we request Mr. Bernard do a workshop for this Council I am sure we can all benefit from this.

EMERGENCY RESOLUTIONS - CARIBOU RIV. COMM. CTR. MSG

Clr. MacKeil reported she was contacted by the Caribou River Community Center on the week-end and advised that the centre has a leak in the roof that requires urgent repair to prevent structural and internal damage. The group had originally applied for an \$1,120 Municipal Services Grant for operating expenses

which is being recommended for approval but is not requesting an additional \$6,000 to carry out these emergency repairs.
