A Message from the Warden

I hope everyone had a reasonably good start to 2021, although we are living in the middle of a pandemic. Our Council continues to work toward a day when all residents will have good quality high-speed internet service and much-improved cell service.

Our Fire Liaison Committee and our Council have reviewed our fire service in our rural areas for the last year and a half. One of the goals is to find a fairer way of funding our 18 fire departments. Our current funding formula is based on assessment only and leads to a deep divide depending on where assessments are growing faster and where they are not. At the same time, we are looking at other means to allow our rural volunteer departments to operate more efficiently and with the most up to date systems available to make better use of dollars and best serve all residents. We are working with the fire chiefs because they are the ones that know the job of putting out fires and attending accidents and other emergencies. We would never want to do anything to negatively affect our fire departments. Our responsibility is to make sure funding is done fairly and look for efficiencies in our operations.

Recreation is a large responsibility of our Council. We commissioned a study about three years ago, and a committee visited many of our rural communities for input on what we need and what we could do better. One of the first things we did was hire another person to help our lone person in that department. Then COVID-19 came along and greatly slowed down the ability of groups to gather. A lot of groups, both with and without buildings, struggle to pay their operating bills when they can hold either no or very limited functions. Council is considering putting extra dollars into the municipal service grants for this year only so that councillors can assist recreation groups in their area. Council is also looking into the high cost of insurance for recreational groups, including liability insurance for many volunteer directors. Ultimately, Council is responsible to you, all the residents in rural Pictou County. If you do not know what your Council is doing, then we need to change that. Our first significant improvement was putting one staff member solely in charge of communications. That includes this publication quarterly along with our website, Facebook, and Twitter pages. Our next big venture to keep you better informed is to livestream our Council meetings. Hopefully, this keeps everyone in the know and allows you to see how difficult it can be, at times, to come to decisions on issues. On behalf of my fellow councillors and our staff, I wish you and your families good health and much happiness. Please, also carefully watch yours and your family's mental health.

Did you know?

Landfill vouchers are available from May to November. They can be mailed out to eligible MOPC residents or picked up at our administration building ONLY during this time.

You can register your dog with the MOPC for \$10 for the neutered/spayed pet's life, and if the tag is lost, there a \$1 replacement fee.

Parking is not permitted directly in front, on the same side of the road, of the Janice Murray Gill Memorial Library. Motorists can park on the opposite of the road and still access free Wi-Fi. Parking is not permitted directly in front of the library because new curbing in that area has narrowed the roadway and makes it difficult for oncoming vehicles to pass each other safely.

INFORMATION GUIDE

72 HOUR Preparedness

When an emergency happens, you will need to have some things ready to use at a moment's notice. You can prepare an emergency kit at any time, so you are more prepared when the worst happens—and so you don't forget something important in the rush of the moment! It is recommended that you be prepared for at least 72 hours.

During the winter months, your emergency kit should be equipped with essential items to keep you warm in the event you're without heat. Additional sweaters, blankets, warm socks, hats, and mittens, would all be beneficial in your kit.

If you have small children and/or pets, consider including extra formula or food, hygiene products, and toys or other entertainment items.



Other items you should consider for your Emergency Kit include: extra change of clothes for each household member; hygiene products and toiletries; sleeping bags or blankets; basic tools (utility knife, hammer, screwdriver, etc.); candles or kerosene lanterns; camp stove; hand sanitizer and face masks; garbage bags.



ICE SAFETY

During the winter months, many individuals take to naturally occurring ice surfaces to participate in outdoor recreational activities. While this can be a fun way to enjoy the outdoors, you should always exercise caution before hitting the ice. Ensure that you know when ice is safe to be on with these tips:

Factors affecting ice thickness:

- Water depth & size of body of water.
- Currents, tides, & other moving water.
- Chemicals, including salt.
- Fluctuations in water levels.
- Logs, rocks, and docks absorbing heat from the sun.
- Changing air temperature.
- Shock waves from vehicles travelling on the ice.

Ice colour:

Clear blue ice is strongest.

White opaque or snow ice is half as strong as blue ice.

- Grey ice is unsafe; this notes the presence of water.
- Ice thickness:
 - Ice should be 15cm thick for skating alone or walking.
 - lce should be 20cm thick for skating parties or games.
 - lce should be 25cm for snowmobiles.



*Check with local authorities before heading out & avoid going on ice at night.

COVID-19 Vaccine Rollout

Vaccines are products that help protect you from viruses that cause illnesses like COVID-19. The COVID-19 vaccine will be free for everyone in Nova Scotia. Nova Scotia's COVID-19 immunization plan includes a 3-phase approach. As more vaccine is received, more groups will become eligible to get the vaccine.

Phase 1

The first phase of Nova Scotia's COVID-19 immunization plan runs from January to April 2021. During this phase, the focus is to immunize priority groups and develop, test, and evaluate different ways to deliver the vaccine before larger amounts of vaccine arrive for the second phase.

Phase 2

The second phase of Nova Scotia's COVID-19 immunization plan is expected to start in May 2021 and includes remaining healthcare workers and essential workers (Public Health is working on the criteria for essential workers who will be included). As more vaccine becomes available more groups will be added based on priority.

Phase 3

The third phase of Nova Scotia's COVID-19 immunization plan is expected to start in summer 2021 and includes the broader community, including anyone who was eligible and did not get the vaccine in phase 1 or 2. www.novascotia.ca/coronavirus

Thanks to outgoing Chief Jason Pitts for your service over the past years.

Water and Tax Billing

Property tax bills are mailed in April (due in June) and August (due in October). Water bills are invoiced quarterly in January, April, July and October. Please ensure you have supplied the Municipality of Pictou County with your correct mailing address, including your P.O Box # (if you have one) to deter delayed payments and notices.

You can pay your property tax or water bills online through your bank by following these instructions:

To begin, you must have a separate payee for each; taxes and water.

Water Utility

Visit our administration building Monday to Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. to pay your bill in person. Social distancing restrictions are in place and masks must be worn inside the building.

Deadlines to Remember

Municipal Grant Applications for the 2021/22 fiscal period are now available. Funding awarded under this policy is intended for the non-profit and charitable organizations that provide community-based programs and services that replace, supplement, or complement a municipal mandate and provide benefits to one or more Council district or the entire municipality. Applications must be returned no later than February 26, 2021. Interested applicants may obtain a copy of the municipality's municipal grants program policy and application form from our website at www.munpict.ca.

Low Income Assistance: Residents in the Municipality of Pictou who earned a total income of less than \$25,000 in 2020 are eligible for a tax exemption. HIGH-SPEED INTERNET UPDATE

We are excited to announce that we have launched a website devoted to our high-speed internet project. *ruralnet.munpict.ca* is your one-stop-shop for background information and updates on our high-speed internet project. It features maps, a photo and video gallery, as well as a link to ROCK Networks' demand aggregation tool, which will help us collect valuable information to assist with the build of our network.

The demand aggregation platform gathers information, including speed tests and surveys, as well as sign-ups that could aid with government funding submissions. You can visit rocknetworks.servicezones.net/pictou (please note this is a third-party site) to enter your address and complete the survey. All information gathered follows privacy guidelines and will only be used for the purpose of the rural internet project. For those with residences in the area designated as Ring 8, you have the option to preselect the type of package you would like to receive; there is no commitment required.

For many of those in the community that have signed up via email to receive more information on the rural internet project, we ask you to visit *ruralnet.munpict.ca* for all future updates. In the meantime, you would have received an email from MOPC requesting you visit the ROCK Networks Platform. We ask that you visit this platform, provide your address and follow the steps.
