

Message from the Warden

Greetings from your Municipal Council as we mark the half way point of our four year term for this Council. Our Council

meets at twice a month - at our regular Council meeting on the first Monday of the month, and our regular committee meeting on the third Monday of each month. Other meetings are held on an 'as needed' basis usually on Mondays but this schedule is flexible. All meetings are 'open' public meetings and we would like to have more people attend, as the decisions made, will often affect you directly. We know that many of you lead busy lives and cannot attend, so we are doing a couple of things to help keep you better informed of your Council's activities and decisions. Our new improved website was launched a few months back and you will find it informative and easier to use. In addition, we have hired a new 'communications officer', whose main focus will be to better inform our tax-paying residents and businesses about Council policies, decisions and future activities. This will allow you to be better informed so you can provide feedback through your councillor on what you would like to see happening in our beautiful rural municipality.

Not unlike any level of government,

jobs and healthcare are major items on our agenda; although in many cases, decisions rest with the two senior levels of government.

On the jobs front, our Municipal Economic Working Group, comprised of councillors from all six municipalities, has officially been transformed into a REN (Regional Economic Network); and is made up of a Board of Directors who will soon hire a CEO to lead their efforts on a daily basis. This group will be led by business and community representatives and their main task is to attract business (and thus, jobs) to Pictou County. The REN was fortunate to find seven very capable individuals willing to devote their time and energy to serve on this volunteer board. The Province and the six Municipalities, along with Pictou Landing First Nations will share in paying the expenses for this REN with all parties committed for a start-up period of five vears.

On the healthcare front, our Municipality has agreed to pay its share (approximately 50% of 1/3 Municipal Contribution) \$24,100 for the next five years to employ a specialist to help recruit more doctors to Pictou County. This is a Nova Scotia Health Authority responsibility so this person will be assisting the Northern Zone recruiter, but will be specifically focused on Pictou

County. On the mental health front, the Mayors and Warden have set up an ad-hoc committee to investigate and help find solutions to the many concerns expressed by our residents about mental health services in Pictou County, specifically at the Aberdeen Hospital. We realize this is not a 'municipal' responsibility but we feel an obligation to speak to senior levels of government about the troubling stories we hear from our constituents. Hopefully, these two efforts will help lead to better healthcare in our County.

Your Council's committees continue to work hard on communications (high speed internet and cellular), energy and recreation. I am optimistic that their efforts will lead to positive results in the last two years of our mandate. Listen for updates over the next few months.

There are many other topics that I would like to update you on, but space does not permit. That is why I am pleased to announce that Sueann Musick will be our new 'Communications Officer'. Sueann's main task will be to keep you informed, but also for you to inform her, so that 'YOUR' Council can do a better job for 'YOU'.

Remember to honour our Veterans on November 11th.

The Hillside Community Society held its first fundraiser this June and it was very successful. The group continues to work hard to raise funds to improve our community with a much needed community center in Hillside. Presently, the group has just purchased the land for the Community Center. The Hillside Girls Club celebrated its 75th anniversary in July. Past and present members came together to share stories, reminisce and reacquaint. I attended the anniversary party; one could just feel the spirit of the club in the room. My wife and daughter were both members of the Hillside Girls Club. The club was originally started by founder Anna Carmichael and continues to operate today under the leadership of Ellen Murphy and Sandra Hattie. This summer I participated in the information sessions with the Advisory Council for the implementation of a National Pharmacare Program. In Canada, we have a publicly funded health care system that is based on need

and not one's ability to pay. However, prescription drugs are not covered in a consistent way across the country and too many of us cannot afford the medications we need. Currently, Canada is the ONLY country with a national Medicare program that does not have a National Pharmacare Program. I believe strongly in this program and will continue to advocate for improvements to our health care system.

The Municipality of Pictou
County will be placing a plaque
to commemorate the birth of the
country's first documented set of
quintuplets born in Pictou County on
February 15th, 1880. These historic
babies were born to Mr. & Mrs. Adam
Murray of Little Egypt Road. The
babies, two boys and three girls, were
delivered by Dr. William Fraser and all
died within days of their birth.

On November 11th we gathered together to commemorate the courageous men and women, past and present, for their service to our country, especially those who made the ultimate sacrifice. It is important to take time to remember and thank our Canadian heroes year round.

I would like to remind the residents of District 9 of the following two rebate programs as they have a timeline.

- Property Tax Rebate for Seniors Applications must be received by December 31, 2018.
- The Heating Assistance Rebate Program – Applications must be received by March 31, 2019.

District 11

It's with pride and pleasure to provide this update on projects happening in District 11. Working with community groups to make improvements to their halls and recreational facilities is rewarding for myself and the greater community. Our greatest strength is our volunteers.

The Plymouth/McLellan's Brook Wastewater Project is now complete. Many of the properties in this area are hooking into the central sewer. This infrastructure was much-needed in the area.

New home construction of houses and accessible rental properties are proof this is a growing community.

One final piece of infrastructure to complete is the McLellan's Brook water line extension. The contract to complete this work has been awarded to SW Weeks. Presently we are awaiting the NS Utilities & Review Board to approve the Municipality taking over the water main from the Town of New Glasgow. The reason New Glasgow's Water Utility owns this section is at the time installed in the mid-1970s the Municipality didn't have a water utility. Upon approval, the work on this section will start. When the waterline is installed the remainder of the road will be resurfaced.

As well, I am lobbying for a more accessible access for pedestrians in Blue Acres. Presently the section doesn't have a cement side walk. This area has a lot of active walkers, joggers and pedestrians who require a safer

way to travel. Costing, becoming a capital priority discussions will happen for a future budget season.

This year also saw a lot of community capital projects take place throughout District 11. Working with volunteer organizations we were successful in a number of grant applications to the three levels of government

The Garden of Eden Community Centre was successful in getting funding for their \$100,000 accessibility project. They received funding from all levels of government and is currently working on the addition to the building which will house two accessible washrooms. This community worked hard to make this a reality and they should be commended for this.

The Bridgeville Community Club was also successful in getting funding for their accessibility project. They received \$35,000 from the provincial Community Facilities Improvement Program (CFIP). The Municipality contributed \$20,000 for this project. When complete the community hall will have a new addition which will house the washrooms and a kitchen area. Along with this a new septic field will be installed.

The MacDonald Rebekah Lodge #108 recently completed a roofing project which was funded through a CFIP grant of \$8,400 and a Council grant of \$5,600. The funding went towards replacing the south side of the roof, and the installation of soffits, fascia and gutters around the

entire building which is located in Sunnybrae.

The East River Valley Recreation Association also experienced a number of improvements and investments in this Springville-based property. Through the hard work of community volunteers, a new backstop was installed on the ballfield, areas were cleared of small trees and alders to extend the outdoor play area and extend the walking track. Blaine McLane Excavating levelled off the area, built a berm to protect the walking track from washing out and seeded the area.

Recently, the volunteer association resurfaced the tennis/basketball courts. This work was funded by Municipal Service Grants from both District 11 and 12, a provincial Community Recreation Capital Grant \$5,000, community donations and funds raised by the Association through bottle drives, pizza fundraiser. The group will continue to fundraise for future capital improvements at this Recreation Complex.

The Plymouth Fire Department and Ladies Auxiliary are presently adding a two bay piece onto the building which will accommodate the larger trucks. As well an addition on the back of the building will provide an entryway and add much needed storage for the many functions they have.

The Plymouth Community Centre was fortunate to receive a \$22,500 CFIP grant to repair the floor in the main hall and install an accessible front entrance. This is important work to make the building accessible to everyone. More recently the Association was successful in the

Solar for Community Building Pilot Program with their application for a solar system. This 22 kW photovoltaic (PV) will sell electricity back to Nova Scotia Power at a preferred rate. This will solve the energy operating costs and make the property sustainable for the long term. This will allow the volunteers to focus on the task of providing recreation to the broader community.

The communities within District 11 are receiving much needed attention. In total, over \$207,000 was awarded to community non-profits in the District. The projects listed above are only those receiving grants from the three levels of government. Halls like Churchville, Glencoe and the Springville Church Hall are also working to improve their halls. Other community groups are working on future projects.

Please stay tuned as I will be announcing some Community Days in some of the halls throughout District 11. These meetings will be in the new year. This will be an opportunity for residents to share their ideas to make our communities better places to live work and play. I look forward to meeting with you. Apple pie baking was a lot of work and a lot of fun. In total, we made 423 apple pies, bagged, boxed and ready for freezer. The pies are made on two separate Saturdays in October. That's a lot of dough to make and roll and more than 300 apples to peel. Emma Marshall was our youngest recruit and works really hard and we are grateful for her help. We would also like to thank the faithful people who purchase these pies.

The Annual Christmas Craft Sale in November is always a great success. Christmas music is playing and people go away with smiles on their faces. Thanks to all the crafters who supply items and to all our faithful friends, both old and new, who support the fundraiser.

We also contributed to the Salt Springs School breakfast program which helps ensure the children start the day right with a healthy, nutritious breakfast.

The Mill Brook Community Club also hosted its Community Fitness Challenge from January to April and we surpassed our goal. This year, we had about 37 participants from age five and up. The challenge ended with a potluck at the community club and a final tally of 62,229 kms. This is a wonderful incentive to keep us moving and active through the long winter months.

The club continues to be involved with the Share the Warmth program which is the making of quilts for non-profit organizations. Atlantic Fabrics manager Debbie Greencorn helps coordinate the program and it provides the material to create warm quilts for less fortunate people. Last fall, our group got together several times and made 23 tie quilts for various sizes. This is a wonderful program for communities to get involved in. It is a wonderful feeling to know we are doing our part and maybe someday down the road, the good deed can be paid forward to someone else who is less fortunate.

Meetings are held the last Tuesday of the month at 7:00 pm in March, April, May, August, September, October (annual meeting) and November. Special meetings are held when necessary to plan upcoming events.

Little Harbour Fire Department

Once again, we remind you to check that your smoke alarm is working and has good batteries. It is a good idea to change your batteries when you change your clocks, spring and fall. It is recommended



that you replace your smoke alarms every 10 years. For those with alarms answered by alarm companies, it is important that they have your proper civic address, as some alarms are answered outside of Nova Scotia and do not work with 911, and sometimes the alarm company gives the wrong address or wrong Fire Department coverage.

This year was the 19th year doing fire prevention week classroom visitation to FH MacDonald and Thorburn schools. It involves six Fire Departments doing a different presentation to individual classes from Primary to Grade Five. Thanks must to go out to these departments for their commitment over the past 19 years - Barney's River, Blue Mountain, Merigomish, Pictou Landing, Linacy and Little Harbour, Most of the presenters have to take time off work to help with this. Again this year, we also had assistance from Little Harbour Fire Auxiliary.

This year's theme for Fire Prevention Week is Look, Listen, Learn. With look, people should look for potential fire dangers in their home. For example, people who smoke should be aware of things like dry grass and leaves when they discard cigarette butts. When it comes to listen, people need to keep an ear out for any alarms in their home. Families should also learn two ways out of each room in their home. With new construction methods and modern furnishing today's homes burn faster and hotter than those of the pre 1970's. We encourage you to draw up an escape plan and practice it so everyone knows the two ways out of each room and where the meeting place is. If your escape involves using a ladder make sure you practice that as well. It's better to find out that someone won't climb down a ladder before an emergency happens so you can come up with an alternative plan.

The civic numbering system is very important to fire departments, police, ambulance, etc. Make sure it is visible from the road in both directions and in low light conditions. With days getting shorter and summer growth, it is more difficult to find the signs. If you require a civic number or repairs to existing numbers, please contact

any member of the Fire Department. The cost per sign including post and installation is the same as last year \$40.00.

We have a trailer at the Fire Hall collecting refundable containers with funds going to the food bank. We will be hosting a Christmas Tree Lighting and Open House on December 4th at 6:30 pm, with tree lighting at 7:00 pm. Hot apple cider, hot chocolate and sweets will be supplied by the Ladies Auxiliary. This event is open to all residents of Little Harbour Fire District. Santa will be there with treats for the children.

We wish you all a safe and happy holiday season and leave you with the following tips:

1. Install several smoke/heat detectors on each floor. Be sure there is one in the garage as well. It is recommended that you replace these alarms every 10 years. For those with home alarms systems answered by

alarm companies it is important that the alarm company have your proper civic address, as some alarms are answered outside of Nova Scotia and do not work with 911. This can result in delays responding and the wrong fire department being dispatched.

2. Make sure there is a fire extinguisher in the kitchen where it can be reached for a stove fire, but not next to the stove.

- 3. If you have a wood stove, be sure you have a metal container for emptying the ashes. Do not store the container on the porch. It needs to be 5 feet away from any structure.
- 4. If you have people that smoke on the porch outside, the butt container should be 5 feet away from any structure.
- 5. Gas cans for the mowers and saws should not be stored in the home or near any heat or fire ignition source.
- 6. Propane barbeques should not be used on a porch with a roof. If you have one on a deck it should be on the side away from the house.
- 7. If you have a circuit breaker in the house that often trips when you use certain appliances, the circuit is overloaded and could start a fire. Get an electrician to install a separate circuit.
- 8. Post your house numbers on the street visible from both directions. Clear away brush that may be blocking the sign. The fire truck or ambulance may not be coming from the direction you normally travel.



Thorburn Fire Department

The Thorburn Fire Department has responded to 40 emergency calls as of mid-October. This will probably evolve to about 50 calls for the year, which has been our average for the past few years.

We are constantly trying to upgrade our capabilities to serve our coverage area. One of these upgrades was the purchase of a new set of batterypowered "extrication tools", commonly known as "jaws of life". These new tools are more user friendly, and much quicker to put in service. Upon arriving on scene, we don our turn-out gear, take the tools out of their cabinet, flip a switch, and we are ready perform the job required. No more pump and hoses, and much less noise. Another upgrade has been the purchase of a pre-owned fire service utility truck from a fire truck dealer in Alberta. It is a 2015 Ford 250, 4 x 4, 5 person cab, fully equipped with a cap, pull-out trays, full complement of emergency lights, reflective stripping, and our own department decals. It replaces a smaller 2005 GMC pick-up, which has been sold. Known as Utility 18, this truck responds to all calls. It carries our Medical First Response

gear, traffic control signs, extra air paks, and other pieces of equipment. It also tows the trailer carrying our "Off-Road Rescue Unit".

As winter approaches, we ask that anyone who burns wood, in their homes or shops, to clean their chimneys and all smoke piping to ensure they are clear of any soot and creosote from the previous heating season. They should also check the condition of their chimneys, and replace any defective smoke piping.

Further along will be the Christmas season decorating chores. Please make sure all electrical wires and cords are in good condition, and that your circuits are not over-loaded. Practice good ladder safety when installing your decorations, and keep fire safety in mind, especially regarding Christmas trees inside the home.

We are always looking for new members. We meet at the Fire Hall located at 736 Marsh Road in Thorburn every Wednesday night from 6:30 to 9:00 pm. If you would like to learn more about what is involved in being a volunteer firefighter, drop in for a chat.

The Story of

Pictou County Volunteer Ground Search And Rescue

There are volunteers in Pictou County that are dedicated, trained, and skilled to find individuals who may find themselves "lost". They are the Pictou County Volunteer Ground Search And Rescue (PCVGSAR). The team have been operating in Pictou County since 1996, but they are a behind-the-scenes organization as can only be called into action by the police.

So how do we know they exist? Currently, they do have a building with their name on it, purchased from the Little Harbour Fire Department, where they house their vehicle and equipment. The team has a general meeting the second Wednesday of the month held at Alma Fire Hall at 7:00 pm as the building in Little Harbour does not have meeting facilities or areas to train. We encourage people who wish to join to come to the meeting or email pcvgsar@gmail. com for information as unfortunately we cannot publicize a phone number as people may think they can call us directly for a search.

As well PCVGSAR is a registered charity, meaning we are dependent on fundraising, donations and grants to buy equipment and vehicles. In 22 years, the team has been able to purchase a logistics vehicle, 4x4 Truck and an ICP trailer (that houses all the equipment, maps, and radios), while at the same time training Searchers, Team Leaders, Radio Operators

and Search Managers. All these positions take various levels of time commitment and practice to function well during a search. All positions are volunteer.

Then there is the volunteer commitment on the searches themselves. Searches can vary in time and location. A few may be just a call out and a stand down, which means someone has been thankfully found. Most times, volunteers answer to an automated call out, starting with SEARCH, SEARCH, SEARCH, and drive to a designated rendezvous point to meet search vehicles. From the rendezvous point, the team must drive to the search location, given by the police, then begin the search or support another GSAR team at a search already in progress. All searches require team resources, equipment and consumable items, like gas, water, food. Each volunteer must be dressed ready to go in any weather. The PCVGSAR team members are responsible for their own clothing and basic equipment like compasses and flashlights. No one is allowed to search without basic required equipment as the safety of the volunteers is paramount.

These are volunteers, who once summoned, put their training and experience to work, to help bring a loved one home. Our goal is always to bring the lost person home safe and sound to their family, but we have



to plan and be ready for all results from any search. Unfortunately not all searches have happy endings but providing closure is important to the families. There is Critical Incident Stress debriefing and counselling offered for those searches.

Besides searching some team members are trained to present Hug-A-Tree. This is a program to teach younger children how to avoid getting lost and what to do if they are lost in order to survive. Schools and community groups use this service which is offered free of charge to the community.

Some team members are Project Lifesaver Technicians. These specially trained members respond 24/7. Clients of this service who are at risk of wandering or becoming lost wear a radio transmitter bracelet. If a client is missing, our technicians track the bracelet and find them.

So who are the members of Pictou County Volunteer Ground Search And Rescue? They are people of your community helping others. So please help them do their jobs by offering your talents. Join the team. If you cannot search we can use you for other positions. Apply at the address or use the email address in this article.

Financial help is very necessary to continue this public service. We would appreciate any community, corporate, or individual donations. 
French River

Bridgeville Community Club

It is not known when the first school was built or who the first teacher was, but there was evidence of at least three log schools around the community. in this building in the early 1950's and they could still see evidence of a blackboard. The next school (the present building) was built on the same corner. It was a one room school



The first school built in the village was on the corner where Diane Swain lives now. It was built around 1840. by residents who volunteered their time and materials. Each family paid a certain amount towards the teacher's salary. The subjects taught were reading, writing and arithmetic. Clergymen and parents visited the school and conducted examinations. Even night classes were held for adults and included singing. When the district decided to sell this school in the 1870's it was moved to the property between the Bridgeville Church (now) and the East River. It was used as a slaughterhouse and later a blacksmith shop. My husband says he and his buddies used to play

with one teacher. In the winter of 1872-1873 Spelling Bees were started by teacher Mr. T.D. MacDonald. Schools in the area competed with small prizes awarded. When the iron ore mines opened in the 1890's the one room school could not accommodate all the pupils (125) so classes were held in the hall above the school. The ceiling in the hall was quite low so the roof was raised in the meantime.

In 1898, a larger school property was deeded from John A. & Margaret Cameron to the School Trustees and the school on the corner was moved about 500 feet to the present location. Another room (called the little room) was built on the south side of the building. One room had Grades 1

to 6 and the other room had Grade 7 and up. The population got smaller after the mines closed (1890's) and the little room no longer needed was torn down and sold in 1920.

Arbor Day was held around the middle of May and was a highlight of the year. No classes were held and there was a cleanup in the morning. My mother-in-law was teacher (while a teenager) at Bridgeville School in 1932-1933 and she told us about taking her students to the "cave" to make ice cream on Arbor Day. A hand turned freezer along with the last ice of the season found in the crevices of the cave was used to make the ice cream.

School fairs were held at Bridgeville for a number of years with competitions in sports, singing, public speaking, drills, banners and baking. 1942. In the 1950's the outhouse was replaced with two chemical toilets (still in use in 2017), the potbellied stove was replaced with a furnace and a well was dug.

There were many teachers who sat behind the desk in Bridgeville. One of note was Mrs. Donald (Effie) Fraser who taught here for 22 years before the Dr. W.A. MacLeod School was built. Mrs. Fraser was greatly respected by her many students far and wide.

In 1974 Bridgeville School, land and premises was deeded to the Trustees of Bridgeville Community Club and their successors in office. For over 40 years numerous members of the community have taken office and have faithfully tried to keep the Community Club going. The first of several country fairs and picnics was



The last school fair was in 1939.

Through the years, the school was used for Sunday School classes and a polling station for both Federal and Provincial elections. Many Christmas concerts were held in the hall above the school. Electricity was installed in

held at the Community Club on July 12 & 13, 1985. These events drew great crowds with parades, woodsmen competitions, men's fashion shows, games, bingo, concerts with local talent and dances under the stars. There were always enough children for

a ball game.

Over the years, the building was well used for community club meetings, card parties, art classes, ceramic classes, exercise classes, sewing and quilting groups, preschool group, tea and sales, concerts, birthday parties, prize bingo and a polling station at election times.

Over the last 10-15 years the activities and fundraisers have diminished. A few grants have been obtained for some alterations and repairs. Within the last year or so, a few members of the community got together to spark a little interest. At that meeting some members felt that with a few modern updates the building can be used more frequently by people in our community and beyond.

The Bridgeville Community Club is now registered with the Nova Scotia Registry of Joint Stock Companies as a



nonprofit society.

We have received municipal and provincial grants to install an on-site sewage disposal system, construction of a new 14 X 24 kitchen and accessible washroom addition and wheel cheer accessible entrance for the club. This project is to start soon. The project will take approximately 20 weeks to complete.

We are so excited with this project and already have attracted new people.

Elmfield Community Hall

Elmfield, in West Pictou County was first settled in 1796 by James McCara, a loyalist soldier.

The Elmfield Community Hall, located at 446 Elmfield Road was formerly the community schoolhouse built in 1872 and was the third schoolhouse built in Elmfield. The schoolhouse was built on lands belonging to

Andrew Graham and John Graham.

The first teacher in this school from 1872-1873, was Alexander H. MacKay, Diamond, who became Superintendent of Education for NS from 1891-1936.

The first Christmas tree in the school was 1912 when Estelle MacKenzie was teacher and it was decorated with 12 candles with clips, obtained from Eaton's catalogue.

The first Elmfield Home and School Association was formed.



Many organizations used the school and many events took place in the school including the Junior Red Cross, Stead Burns Mission Band, Sons of Temperance, Christian Endeavor, Church Services, Sunday School, Pie Socials, Singing School, Agriculture Society, Missionary Meetings, Card Parties and Elections.

The school played an integral part in the community until it closed in 1967 and became the Elmfield Community Hall.

The snowmobile club has been working on and completed a strategic plan to identify the future direction and needs of the club. Some of the key long-term areas or issues identified in our strategic planning sessions were to obtain a building to house our groomers and trail equipment, a clubhouse/meeting place, and a trailhead for our trail system.

This winter season is very exciting because the Board of Directors of the Elmfield Community Hall have gifted their hall to our snowmobile club. The Community Hall had experienced dwindling interest and activities and felt there was not enough interest or ability in the aging population of the community to maintain, manage and renovate the hall because of some significant building issues. The hall has been vacant and unused for most of the last two years and will require improvements going forward.

The Elmfield Community Hall will provide the beginning of a future site that will provide a facility and land to build a groomer shed. The other issue that this venture will solve is the longterm viability of the historic Elmfield Community Hall. The building was built in the late 19th century and has served the community in many capacities from its beginnings as a school, a place for many various and interesting groups to meet and a community center where members of the community could hold socials, card games, dances, fund-raisers and a rental facility for other groups' use.

The club intends to keep the hall as a community center for the residents of Elmfield, with active consultation from residents and to renovate it to bring its bathrooms, kitchen, heating and electrical system up to an acceptable standard in compliance with current building and accessibility codes.

The club has been quite busy fund-raising for our new venture with an annual golf tournament, snowmobile and ATV rallies and other small events. So far, we have raised over \$8,000 just this past summer. In order to access the hall from our trail system, a local landowner has graciously given permission and access to their land so we can connect the hall to the SANS/DMSC provincial trail system. We have already started the process of installing a bridge to cross a large drainage ditch and provide mapping to indicate the location and services this will provide to all trail users.

Dalhousie Mountain Snowmobile Club (DMSC) has been very active over the last 30 years developing and maintaining the 300 kms of trails in Pictou and Colchester Counties. Most of the trails the snowmobile club maintains are multi-use and are used by many outdoor enthusiasts, yearround.

We would like to thank all who support the club. We meet the first Tuesday of the month at the Elmfield Community Hall, 446 Elmfield Road, Elmfield at 7:00 pm and welcome anyone interested in snowmobiling or trail related activities to attend.
